Dr Tania Dottorini has received funding from Innovate UK and the Chinese Ministry of Science to improve the health of farmed chickens in China and reduce the risk of disease and antibiotic resistance transferring to human populations. FarmWatch makes use of machine learning to identify disease on poultry farms.

The 7th International EurOMA Sustainable Operations and Supply Chains Forum will be hosted by Nottingham University Business School on 10th, 11th and 12th February 2020.

The theme of the Forum at Nottingham is "Sustainability as Flourishing".
